Welcome to this special commemorative magazine edition of Ruggles Camp. We pray this will be a keepsake for Ruggles families for years to come. There is such an abundance of history to Ruggles it is impossible to capture it all in words or in pictures. 150 years is a great milestone and we have been in a celebrative mood since we began our 150th Camp Meeting last year - July 20-31st, 2022. Ironically, Asbury Seminary in Wilmore, KY, where I went to school in the 80's is having their 100th Anniversary this year. They are using the hymn "Great Is Thy Faithfulness" for their special edition –as we, but for different reasons. Ruggles focus on this wonderful hymn is namely the second verse:

Summer and winter and springtime and harvest, sun, moon, and stars in their courses above join with all nature in manifold witness to Thy great faithfulness, mercy and love.

Summer is the peak time for Camps and truly *great* is the Lord's faithfulness that has brought pilgrims to Ruggles for all these years. The testimony of Ruggles is about God. For 150 years campers of all ages have descended on the holy grounds for hearts to be strangely warmed and to spread scriptural holiness throughout the land. One of my favorite quotes (among many) is from 1910"The last day is here and no one wants to leave." The sentiment of this statement lives in every Camper's heart.

Yet, we do leave...we come down from the mountain - like Jesus on the Mt. of Transfiguration as there was great need awaiting Him. We too, don't run from it, we don't hide, we march and go forward, even when life reduces us to a crawl - we keep going Forward in the Faith.








Minnie Emmons Doyle

Camp Meetings are an important part of my life. I got saved when I was 6 years old at an Arbovale West Virginia Camp Meeting the year it was founded by my grandfather. At the age of 91, I still see in the mind's eye that little preacher as he made hell real and a life with Jesus so wonderful and necessary.

I remember the first time I saw Ruggles Camp Ground at Pastor's School in July of 1987. At the gate you were greeted by an indescribable building which was falling down. As you passed through the gate on the right was a strand of barbed wire held up by intermittent iron posts. Behind that was a grown up swamp as far as one could see. You arrived at a small scummy pond with an old wooden, decayed bath house occupying the North edge and then a house trailer with empty cans and junk scattered around... Across from the trailer was a combination chapel and garage which really was a horse stall with all of its natural beauty. The Lane building, a decaying mess of a dormitory, stood on the left and as you progressed past the dining room you faced a grown up woods. The grounds were surrounded by a rusty fence which had fallen down in the midst of rampant undergrowth. Some of the cabins were in disrepair and the tabernacle needed a coat of paint.

I wondered what the Lord thought of His Meeting Place, even though in all of this mess people were wonderfully saved and lives were changed - a picture of this old world since Jesus came.

We students slept in the girl's dorm on iron army beds and flat springless mattresses in the sweltering heat. We stuck to our mattresses at night during an unforgettable experience while during the day we were introduced to the art of preaching by folks named Sweazy, Gibson, Cropper and others.

Then in 1992 I graduated from Seminary and became a United Methodist Minister assigned to the church in Vanceburg, KY. Being a Camp Meeting kid, I became attached to nearby Ruggles Camp, eventually building a cabin in 2005 and marrying my childhood sweetheart in the Tabernacle in 2008 while helping some wonderful people clean up a mess and replace it with beauty. A challenging pickingup sticks, chainsawing, tearingdown, building adventure!

Ruggles Camp resembles my life since I first saw it in 1987. It became a changed place and so did I. Lives are still being renewed in a beautiful place which some folks think of as being next to heaven.







One of the greatest servants of Christ I've known was a Catholic Priest. Father Ralph W. Beiting was from Northern KY but went to the mountains of Eastern KY and was the founder of the Christian Appalachian Project (CAP). Robin and I were serving in Inez, KY in the 90's when we got to meet and work with Father Beiting.

He shared his testimony once by simply saying, "I came to the mountains and I fell in love." Those words touched my heart. His love for Jesus poured out in service for God's people till his dying days. I feel a similar passion when I came to Ruggles Camp. I fell in love with Ruggles when I first came in 1987 at the License to Preach School. (Brother Jim Finch was in that same school who I also greatly admire!) I fell in love when I returned in June of 2008 when Tom Coe of Maysville Trinity said "go and check out what's going on at Ruggles—Marketplace." I did and my heart was warmed with joy even though I got lost on the way back! Perhaps my love deepened as I further learned that my great grandfather, Rev. David Johnson was a preacher in 1935 at Ruggles. He worked the Camp for several years as he served in Ashland.

Church Camp was transformational to me in childhood/youth and I've always wanted to give back. The Bible says we love only because God first loved us. My prayer is that this will be my mission—likened to my great-grandfather, Rev. Johnson, Rev. Jim Finch and Father Ralph Beiting.

Report to the Ruggles Board of Directors March 23rd, 2023 7:00 p.m.

I am happy to report to the Board that the legal transfer of property of Ruggles Camp has now taken place and this took place legally on February 10th, 2023. The Deed is recorded in the Vanceburg, KY Courthouse. For history buffs...here is a brief overview and timeline:

- 1) 1873 Ruggles Camp is established, the first Camp Meeting took place (August)
- 2) **1880 March 20th -** William Ruggles deeded his property to the "Board of Directors of the Maysville District Camp meeting association of the Methodist Episcopal Church. (The cost was \$500 "to be paid on the 1st day of September 1883")
- 3) **1947 March 5th -** Ruggles Camp Meeting Association of the Methodist Church, (successor to Maysville District Camp Meeting Association of the Methodist Episcopal Church) deeded the property to the Board of Evangelism, as Trustees, for, Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Church ("in consideration of the sum of One Dollar, cash in hand paid...")
- 4) 2005 December 20th The Camp purchased the adjacent farm and received the Deed from Barbara Holt, Executrix for Estate of Nancy Bartolin, deceased, for the sum of (\$148,000.00). (This is the amount recorded in the Deed—there were some other expenses involved in the transfer...this was paid off in 2017 with a note-burning the final night of Camp Meeting—enlarging the Camp by 61 ½ acres.)
- 5) 2021 December The Ruggles Board of Directors authorized the Ex. Committee to enter into conversation with Tom Coe, of Maysville, KY, a KY Conference Trustee about exiting out of the property agreement with the KY Annual Conference thus "Deeding" back the property to the Ruggles Camp Board of Directors.
- 6) 2022 Various discussions take place regarding the Deed transfer with Tom Coe, and the KY Conference Chancellor, Courtney Preston Kellner. The KY Conference Trustees agreed to transfer the Deed back to the Ruggles B.O.D. However, various delays took place as 57 churches disaffiliated from the KY Annual Conference in December of 2022, requiring much legal work plus Tom Coe passed away in August 2022.
- 7) **2023 January 6th** The Quit Claim Deed comes by way of E-Mail for review from the Chancellor's Office. *However*, upon review there is confusion about property lines, boundaries, etc. The Deed had to be rewritten to be correct. At this time, there are hundreds of churches discerning disaffiliation from the KAC. Because of this, there was concern that there would be further delay in the final transfer of the Deed.
- 8) 2023 February 10th The *correct* Quit Claim Deed is filed in the Vanceburg, KY and much gratitude and thanks to God and to Rev. Jim Finch for pursuing the correct legal paths to ensure the proper transfer of the Deed. The entire property (approx. 81 ½ acres) is owned by Ruggles Camp and Retreat Center INC.

Ruggles Camp Meetings, Notes/Days & Evangelists A Brief, Historical Perspective

This document is a small attempt to help the Ruggles Camp family and friends walk through time with a few of the highlights during the past 150 years of the Camp, namely the Camp Meeting. One of the greatest resources we have has been the local newspapers and in particular, one newspaper editor by the name of J. Harry Richardson (often to referred to as "J.H."). J. H. Richardson wrote for the Maysville Public Ledger and served on the Ruggles Board of Directors, serving as President at times. Mr. Richardson was passionate about the mission of Ruggles and wrote and published the daily activities of the Camp Meeting for approximately 50 years!

We are also blessed by the great work of James Columbia, who put 40 years of numerous newspaper articles in one Volume called "Dispatches From Ruggles 1882-1922". This is a tremendous resource! Also, the late Rev. Kenny Jett, who served as Chairperson of the Archives and History Commission of the KY Conference, and worked on the historical records of the Camp and brought valuable resources and information.

The history of Ruggles Camp is remarkable—truly and only by the grace of God! Because of the local newspapers, computers, diligent research on behalf of *many*, we have been able to come up with the actual dates and a few notes of virtually all of the 150 Camp Meetings! Looking at the dates and numbers closely, we begin to see various number patterns in the 150 years. For example, the following chart:






